Meet an EAA 569 Member

Back in the good ol' days even your neighborhood drugstore carried an assortment of balsa model airplane kits. Yeah, there were neighborhood drugstores. Starting in 1952, I built lots of Comet Struct-o-speed balsa models. A

favorite was the all balsa Curtiss Robin. Balanced with a chairglide stuck on the nose, it made a wonderful glider. Unforgettable: the Robin gliding south over Deerfield Avenue; the car coming fast, north on Deerfield Avenue. I was sure the steel chairglide on the Robin nose would smash into the car's windshield -- but no! A foot in front of the glass, the Robin got in the rising air flowing over the car and and slope-soared over the windshield ridge! My Comet Ercoupe won a prize in a junior high science fair. Ten years later, I built another one that became one of my most dependable flyers. Secret: enlarge the horizontal stab!

Summer of '68, I did nothing but build and fly model airplanes. These were hand-launch gliders, and rubber-powered scale models or endurance models. And why not? I had my Ph.D. in hand, and a good job already lined up to start

that fall. Every nice day that summer I was there at Eks Field (three baseball diamonds) on the north edge of Chicago. I still have a scar on my left wrist where the towline from a Comet Phantom Fury -- which I had converted from rubber power to towline glider -- paid out over the flesh instead of over the reel. Got a nice flight though. Lost the plane; kept the scar.

In all this early aviation enthusiasm, I skipped over some minor stuff. In college, spring of

'63, I met a very smart girl in Physics 357, proposed to her that fall (at age 19!). We, Joanna Fink and I, got fellowships for grad school and took them to Northwestern. Eager to provide a home and have family, I went through grad school lickety-split. (24-year-old Ph.D!) First teaching job was University of Hawaii. No Hawaii modeling, but Ruth, now a P.E. (Professional Engineer), was born there in 1970; Landed in

Lincoln September of '70, with an office in Andrews Hall. (Still there teaching Latin, Greek, and such other courses as Classical Mythology) Rose, M.B.A. and RPCV (Returned Peace Corps Volunteer) was born here in 1972.

Back to the important stuff: Spring of '71, I took a \$5 Cessna coupon to Arrow Airport here in Lincoln and got my introductory flight lesson. Realized lots o' stuff, like family responsibilities, had to happen before I'd be a pilot: Get the daughters raised, get them through

college, get them married off, and quick, right there, get a pilot's license before they start buying houses! It was a close race. My ticket came March 17, 2000. A daughter closed on a house with help from First National Bank of Mom and Dad March 31. That summer Wally Peterson, of blessed memory, gave me a

chance to go halves with him in his Cessna 150. When Wally lost his medical, buying him out was the most natural thing in the world.

Thank you's: This aviation scribble was made possible by the help, encouragement, and support of Chapter 569, with spurs from Roger Aspegren, and with live mentoring from Wally Peterson and Chuck Oden. I wouldn't be a pilot without this chapter and these people. Thank you.
