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Volkmer, Keeper of the Treasures of Aladdin's Cave By Tom Winter

Lead-off item in Dennis Crispin's President's Message for January 2007: "We have a new newsletter editor. Doug Volkmer has volunteered to contribute his time and computer skills to getting out our monthly publication."

What a run! and what a gold-mine of Chapter history: every month, for the ensuing 14 + years, Doug has put out a newsletter, that's 171 so far, and has archived a copy on the chapter website — not to mention maintaining the website itself! Go to https://eaa569.org/blog/eaachapter-569-newsletters, and cast your eyes on the treasures.

Before the Volkmer era, putting out our chapter newsletter was a job someone would take on for a year, or maybe two or three years in a row, and then bow out, leaving the chapter scraping.

Our earliest available newsletter is November 1984. Jim Fix was president, Jerry Muhle was veep, and Jeff Clausen was the editor. Main feature of this issue was a Walter Mitty-esque piece by Jeff, imagining that his Plymouth was a P-51 dealing with Messerschmidts and Focke-Wulfs rolling along I-80.

Ted Oehlert was editor in 1986, 1987 and 1989. (The archive is missing all of 1988*). Les Christianson was editor in 1990, and Clay Champoux was president. The time machine aspect of it hits me: What a delight to be reminded of Clay! Such a gentle soul! His signature is in my logbooks, and last I saw him, he was horizontal in a hospital bed. Good old Clay!

My old partner Wally Peterson was editor in 1991. He mailed them out himself! The addresses are in his handwriting. A highlight of Wally's year is Lester Christianson's essay "The Stuff of Dreams" in which he sings a paean to small airports, laments the recent loss of Arrow Airport (a dump! a city dump!) and the Lancaster County Board rejecting a plan to put in an airstrip southeast of Lincoln. Luckily for us, Doug does not have to address the issues and lick the stamps: John Cox takes care of getting the issues to us. Thank you John!

In the mid 90's Roger Aspegren produced the newsletter. (1992, 93, 94) Sample the February 1993 number and read about Jim Fix making a Pitts pedal car for his grandson! Ken Mueller was president. Good to be reminded of Ken. Thirty six years ago, and there you are again.

The next year, Roger moved up to president and Terry Carlson was editor.

Mark Turner produced a jampacked newsletter in '96 and '97.

In '97 Doug Hill, incoming president, introduces himself with a short autobiography from Duncan line boy to Hillaero, where he still sweeps the hangar floor! The January '97 number also includes a telephone tree: look it over and see how many members from 24 years ago you know, knew or remember! Sadly, Mark resigned before the year was out, leaving vice-president Terry Carlson to fill out the year.

In '98, Ray Supalla was the editor.

I remember when Roger Aspegren took over as Newsletter editor again in 1999. He did it, not because he wanted to, but because it needed to be done, was essential as the glue to hold the chapter together, so he stepped in, and he named it The Communicator. That year, I had just replaced George Myers as Young Eagle Coordinator. We had board meetings, in advance of every chapter meeting, and they included the YE guy, me, in the board.

July 1999 was my very first article for The Communicator, a long account of a bike ride through the countryside (not a flight!) to meet Jan and Barry Daniels, operators of the Weeping Water Airport, now private, and run by and for a skydiving club. Barry, a pillar of the chapter is gone. Last I knew, Jan is still active in Chapter 80. That bicycle to Brown's was my first of 69 articles for the chapter.

Chapter newsletters are missing for the years 2000-2004 inclusive, and when they reappear for 2005, Dennis Crispin is the editor. That was the year Tom Trumble joined me as YE coordinator (I had learned that you didn't have to have just one!) "Dennis produced a fantastic monthly newsletter and has invested serious time and effort into composing original stories about

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member projects and club events" wrote president Andy Lahr in his year-end thank you's.

*A final note: Doug Volkmer has scanned in many of the pre-2004 issues, mostly from Jerry Carlson's backfiles. Check your basement, check your attic. If you can fill in the missing years, bring backfiles to the next meetings!

Merit Badges at SAC Museum By Dennis Crispin

Boy Scouts from all over the Midwest look forward each year to a Merit Badge Overnight at Strategic Air Command & Aerospace Museum. The Museum hosts programs that give the Scouts a lesson in history, allows them to earn a Merit Badge and have a lot of fun while doing it. The programs are built around the Scouting requirements for a specific Merit badge. Most popular currently are the Aviation, Engineering and Robotics Merit Badges.

Within the evening's activities, the Scouts receive an explanation of the role of the U.S. Air Force and Strategic Air Command in the era known as the Cold War. A guided tour of the hangers showcases the historic aircraft and other artifacts of this important part of world history.

At the end of the busy evening, the scouts get to camp for the night under the impressive SR-71 "Blackbird" aircraft. Where else do you get to sleep under the world's fastest, highest flying airplane?

An overnight program, called SAC Adventures, is geared to the younger, Cub Scout age kids. It focuses on activities selected for the fun factor; however, the Museum always slips in a bit of education with the entertainment.

The Museum's Education Department also provides outreach programs to the schools, Virtual Activity Field Trips, "field day" tours of the museum and summertime youth day camps.

Education Director Mark Strehle said "The Education Department is currently distributing support materials for our Virtual Activity Field Trips and Tour to 63 school buildings, 350 classes and 12,850 students in the Omaha Public Schools. The Sherwood Foundation graciously provided a grant allowing us to support this district despite COVID-related safety restrictions confining students to their buildings. We intend to circulate these and expanded materials to underserved rural school districts in the upcoming school year."

SAC Museum houses an extensive collection of rare and historically significant military aircraft. It is the only museum in the world dedicated to the Cold War. You can find it midway between Lincoln and Omaha at exit 426 off Interstate 80.

Interested in a Vans RV-9A Flying Club?

Are you interested in exploring the idea of a flying club with a Vans RV-9A aircraft? These airplanes are a joy to fly, go fast, have modern avionic panels (with autopilot), and are like a "magic carpet". They are also experimental, and yes, it is OK to have a flying club that deploys Vans RV-9A experimental aircraft. See the AOPA web link below, for further discussion on the topic of a flying club having an experimental aircraft. I have a nice RV-9A with a Lycoming O-320 engine rated at 160 hp, driving a fixed pitch prop. The optimal mission for these aircraft includes flying at higher altitudes, in a very efficient manner (about 7.5 gal per hour), with an easy cruise speed of 140 kts TAS. Of course, it is a wonderful machine for local flights and the all-important \$100 hamburger. In addition, based on my research, it appears as though flying clubs offer the "best bang for the buck" in terms of flying enjoyment, risk management, and economics. Plus, it is possible to learn to fly under the auspices of this type of flying club, as long as the learner is a member of the club. AOPA offers tremendous support for establishing and sustaining flying clubs. With this concept in mind, it seems that an ideal club size for this situation, would be on the order of 3 to 5 like-minded individuals. If you're interested in flying a very popular aircraft, with all the modern amenities, and getting places fairly quickly in an economical manner, or just flying around the area in a fun and modern aircraft, lets visit about the possibilities.
