Proper eye protection is a must for safe viewing; ISO certified glasses are available for low cost through many vendors. The time period for the eclipse runs from about 11:30 to 2:30. The period of totality begins just after 1:00 and will last about two minutes. The drive is normally around 90 minutes from Lincoln though traffic might be

heavier than normal; so, do plan accordingly.
