Cessna People Stories

There are seminars here (Cessna 150-152 Fly-In, Clinton, IA) and they are educational and all qualify for Wings credit (Whatever Wings is). I just heard an IA speak for an hour on typical problems for my airplane. And of course, I find the planes a delight. And Tuesday at dawn, having the sky all to myself, I flew along the Mississippi admiring the river islands where Huck Finn and Tom Sawyer played pirate. But this year the essence was touring neither the planes nor the landscape, but the people. A few vignettes:

A North Dakota farmer, who keeps his Kitfox, wings folded, in his garage, paid off his farm with oil pipeline easement money: \$500 a rod. There are 320 rods to the mile. The easement for bigger diameter pipe, 20 inches, is \$800 a rod. And if there are five lines crossing your fields, it comes to serious money. It's a one-time payment to cover a 20-year easement. What about consequential damage? I ask. Making good for damage, after some haggling, is on the company. In his area, "you can't see a section without some bulldozers on it."

Today I attended Alan Core's engine and airframe seminar, and David Rowland's presentation on making the switch to a 150-150. John and Lori Cox stopped on their way to where daughter Jamie is interning in Missouri. John and Lori stayed for lunch. They toured the 150s hand-in-hand. The sight

touched my romantic heart. I took pictures.

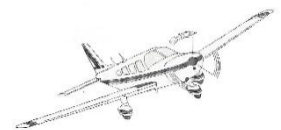

He was interested, so I showed him our planes, and finally said "Enough looking. Hop in and we'll fly over your farm" And we did. Now we are good friends. Nice chat about farming. He worked for a farm equipment dealer, and learned the machinery, then got a job working for Farmland Coop and learned the business side, and then was ready to farm for himself. Now his son is 24, and John will retire after he teaches his son the art of farming. He delights that his son asked to come back to the farm. John bought his grandmother's farm and will receive recognition for a farm that's been all in the same family for 150 years.

After the seminars, I glad-handed a newbie, Clair Pečinovski with my best ice-breaker: "I don't know your name. Let's fix that right now!" Clair is retired and now is airport manager (minimum wage, 8 hrs a day) at Cresco, IA — "Ellen Church

Field," named after the first airline stewardess. Ellen Church was a registered nurse, and a licensed pilot, but hireable then only as a stewardess, a job she had to sell: "Don't you think that it would be good psychology to have women up in the air? How is a man going to say he is afraid to fly when a woman is working on the plane?")

I used my laptop to find Cresco, and closed in on Cresco so he could show me his house (I just love our modern age!). Just a hoot and a holler from Spillville, where my musical hero Antonin Dvorak spent the summer of 1893. I demonstrated my folding bike.

Bob Tidd is 82, and his son makes a living as a pilot. Bob nursed his wife through her cancer. A full-body scan showed white dots all the way from her toes to the hair of her head. The M.D. said "the cancer shows up as the white dots." And "Nothing more to do. Just take her home and see to her comfort." His wife died of cancer in his arms. He told me her last words: "Go to our son and finish your pilot's license."

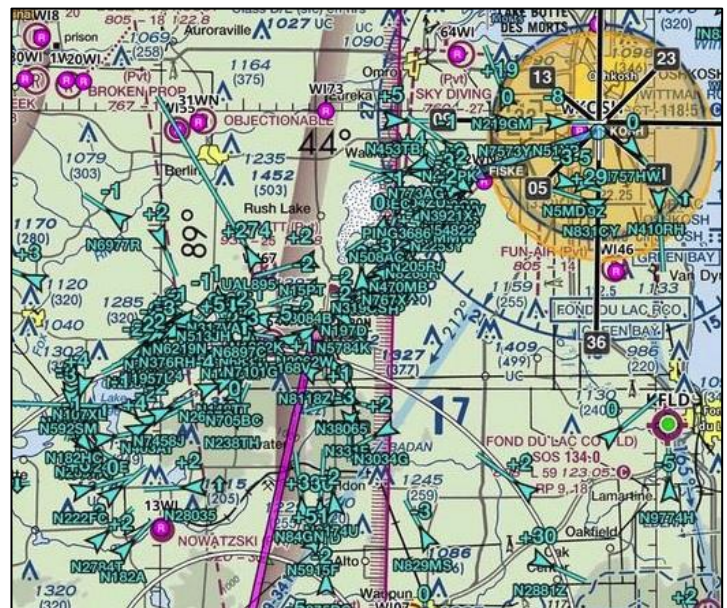

EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2018 Facts and Figures

Comment from EAA Chairman Jack Pelton:

“A ‘perfect’ event may be unattainable, but AirVenture 2018 came about as close as one could imagine. The combination of outstanding programs, aircraft variety, a robust economy, and good

weather combined to complement the efforts of our staff and 5,000 volunteers throughout the grounds. The week was upbeat, exciting, and filled with many ‘Only at Oshkosh’ moments.”

Attendance: Approximately 601,000, nearly two percent above of 2017’s record total.

Total aircraft: More than 10,000 aircraft arrived at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh and other airports in east-central Wisconsin. At Wittman alone, there were

19,588 aircraft operations in the 11-day period from July 20-30, which is an average of approximately 134 takeoffs/landings per hour.

Total showplanes: 2,979 (second straight year over 2,900): 1,160 homebuilt aircraft (5 percent increase), 1,094 vintage airplanes, 377 warbirds (7 percent increase), 185 ultralights and light-sport aircraft, 75 seaplanes, 22 rotorcraft, 52 aerobatic aircraft, and 14 hot air balloons.
