'FLYING START' PROGRAM HELPS FULFILL DREAMS OF FLIGHT FROM EAA HEADQUARTERS

A new nationwide program introduced by the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) will share the enthusiasm and excitement of aviation and help 'open the door' to personal flight.

The Flying Start program is designed as a first step for those who may have thought about learning to fly, but didn't know where to get specific information. The initiative allows those unfamiliar with flying to learn alongside others having similar enthusiasm, as they discover what first steps to take for success.

The national program also highlights the social and family elements of aviation through EAA's 890 local Chapters. Flying Start will be presented through those Chapters, allowing each presentation to be shaped specifically for local residents. EAA provides structure for the initiative and support for local Chapter hosts, as well as follow-up for those who attend the presentations.

"There are tens of thousands of people who have thought about learning to fly," said EAA President Tom Poberezny. "Flying Start is a place to make local aviation friends who can support and encourage each other. This program creates a comfortable setting with others there for the same purpose. It's where people can ask the questions they've always wondered about and find out what questions they need to ask when they're ready to take the next step. The program incorporates what EAA does best - it supports aviation enthusiasts with locally based efforts coordinated by dedicated EAA Chapters throughout the country."

Flying Start programs will be hosted by EAA Chapters and take place at local airports. The structured one-hour presentations address all aspects of flying, including pilot privileges, finding the right instructor, cost, ground school and other resources. Local instructors, flight schools, fixed base operators and support groups will be available for one-on-one discussions after the presentations.

The first Flying Start presentation will take place at Columbia, S.C., on April 23, hosted by EAA Chapter 242. EAA's goal is to present 100 Flying Start programs by the end of 1997, with more scheduled throughout 1998.

The program, officially introduced at the Sun 'n Fun EAA Fly-In at Lakeland, Fla., is based on presentations created by EAA Chapter 579 in Aurora, Ill. Since the initial program about a year ago, the Chapter has introduced flying to hundreds of people and brought dozens into flight instruction.

"Flying Start is a way to help people realize that flying an airplane may be within their grasp," Poberezny concluded. "This program is an easy, no-cost, non-threatening way for people to 'dip their toe' into the world of aviation before deciding that the joy of flight is a achievement worth pursuing."

VOLUNTEER BURNOUT


