Life is better with The Little Things **Under Control** A live and learn collection

In the pre-flight, you see that your oil is a quart low. Baby Pilot bikes to the FBO (there is a bike in the hangar) and buys two expensive quarts, one for spare. Finally, I stopped at Whitehead Oil — it's right on my way to work at the corner of Randolph and Capital Parkway. "Do you sell aviation oil?" "Sure. How much do you want?" Now I buy it there by the case. In February, I paid them \$54 for a case of 100wt aviation oil. (Harry Barr told me once "100 weight and preheat. Those 0-200s love it") Now there is always spare oil in the hangar, and a spare quart in the plane.

Want to blow your fuse? Get to the airport without your hangar key! It's a mistake that you make once. Imagine the dismay: Here I am at the gate, and oops! (Or stronger language!) Now I have to drive back home and get the key. Or perhaps worse: "Darn it! I can't go fly, I can't find my flight bag! (and it has the hangar key in it!) Misplacing your flight bag (that you keep the hangar key in) is also a mistake that you make once. Now, of course, the flight bag has a Sacred Spot. And The Sacred Spot is where it is.

No end of the little misadventures: "Well darn," you realize as you are already airborne, "I didn't bring the bike lock. Hope nobody in [name of small town] steals my origami bike!" Note to self: Make a before-leavinghome checklist. Put "Bike lock" on it.

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PAIGE HIGGINS WENT TO HER LAST DAY OF SCHOOL BY HELICOPTER!

For most of us, the last day of high school has some specific memories – year books to autograph, lockers to vacate, friends and classmates to say "goodbye" to. For Norris High School senior Paige Higgins, the last full day of school will always have a unique memory – it was the day she went to school by helicopter.

The consolidated Norris School System serves several communities in southeast Nebraska. The large campus is about 20 miles south of Lincoln.

Paige doesn't drive and had requested that she be driven to school on her last day so that she wouldn't have to ride the bus. Paige's mother, Cristi Higgins, is a lady with a rare ability to manage unusual situations and she conspired with fellow EAAer, Larry Geiger, to surprise Paige with a ride to school in his helicopter.

The flight flew over Paige's Lincoln neighborhood, went past the State Capitol, and looked down on Memorial Stadium. There were many waves and shouts from the ground as the aircraft orbited the Norris campus. Paige's reaction was "awesome!!!"

Some critical childhood diseases set Paige on a path of delayed development. Now that she has completed the special programs in the Norris School system she will move on to a state vocational rehabilitation program. Paige participates in the basketball and bowling events of the Special Olympics. She notes with pride that she is the youngest dues paying member of EAA Chapter 569.



Cristi Higgins, Paige's mother, is a licensed pilot and a lifelong aviation enthusiast. She is the Young Eagles Coordinator and a past president of Chapter 569 of the Experimental Aircraft Association.

Paige was probably the only student transported to school by helicopter in Nebraska this year and, as far as it is known, the only kid ever to go to Norris by air. It will be a wonderful, lasting memory.

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
