How a new and exciting excuse to fly got me on TV and YouTube!

Once upon a time Santa equipped the Bluebird of Happiness with a folding bike (Recommended, by the way, a Downtube Avon, half the price of the Brunton or the Bike Friday, and at least as good. Weighs 24 pounds). And the Bluebird flew to David City, where the silly pilot made the wrong choice for cross-wind dealing, went around and landed, this time without the Xwind tailwind component. Pulled out the folder, shook it like a blanket, heard it click, and bicycled into town.

On one of the taller David City buildings, ancient paint was still readable: THORPE OPERA HOUSE. Pilot stopped in front, where the sign said Chamber of Commerce. Walked in and asked about the old sign. Opera House? City Planner Keith Marvin replied "It's still here!"

He unlocked the doors to the opera house stairs, and guided me up. Wow! A second floor complete theater! The floor was set up as if for dinner theater, and the stage still had its ancient curtain, and furnishings. What a bicycle tour treat! It had been preserved for more than a century, and clearly deserved to be preserved for years yet to come.

"We need all the help we can get," the City Planner said. Digging at home, I found out that in 1889 Nebraska had 126 Opera Houses. Lincoln historian Jim McKee recently wrote there might be as many as 50 left. What could I do to help? I started the Old Nebraska Opera Houses Facebook page. And there was a built-in excuse to fly: Land in small-town Nebraska and see what state their Opera House was in. These investigating flights worked better if I could line up someone from a county historical society to be my guide. So part of my flight planning is to see if I can line up savvy local help.

The surviving opera houses in general owe their continued existence to organized local support. Some county historical societies are inert, apparently only a name. The alternative is dire: Louisville's was torn down and a Chevy dealership is on the site: the local library does not even have a photograph of it. Crete's is a modern savings and loan building plus parking lot.

But Table Rock's support is exemplary. Their historical society was formed in the '60s. They first made the opera house a county museum, and have currently reclaimed the opera house for actual theater shows. Sharla Cerra, head of the TRHS, is a real sparkplug. Some years back, she met me at the Pawnee City airstrip and got me access to both the Steinauer Opera House and the Table Rock Opera House.

At Table Rock she explained how they got engineering help fix the ceiling, and then she put me on center stage, asking me to do something. I declaimed the opening lines of Cicero's speech against Catiline. I had no idea that it was an audition!

Constant use is why the Pantheon in Rome is still standing, roof and all, and constant use is the TRHS plan for their opera house: Sharla put together a variety show back in May, and another just yesterday, October 25 with a halloween theme: She lined up drama students from UNL to do Act 1, Scene 1 of Hamlet, the ghost scene. I was the ghost. Then the State Poet, Matt Mason, read halloween poems, then

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I delivered the Crispin's Day speech from Henry V (October 25 is actually St Crispin's Day, so selecting the rousing St Crispin's Day speech was a no-brainer!) Then the operatic singers from UNL took over, culminating in the old song of the Cursed Wife that even the devil couldn't deal with, and so brought her back to her husband!

And the TV and YouTube appearance? To publicize the show, Sharla Cerra lined up a spot with Jon Vanderford's Pure Nebraska, and had me along so there could be a sample, else it would have been just a bulletin board sort of announcement.

Apparently Channel 10/11 liked it.

Getting the prop balanced

One thing that has been on my to-do listing since I've been flying my RV-7 was to get the prop balanced. I sat in on a forum at Oshkosh last year that talked about the importance of getting your prop balanced. Some things that were pointed out —

- Smoother flight: A balanced propeller provides a smoother flight.
- Longer component life: Balancing a propeller helps prolong the life of the aircraft's engine, airframe, avionics, and propeller.
- o Reduced vibration: Vibration can cause fatigue, cracks, and failures in aircraft components.

On his test flights of my RV, Doug Roth did not notice any abnormal vibrations but stated it would be good to have it checked anyway.

In September, I took my plane to the York Airport and had Justin Hall do the honors. Justin uses a DynaVibe GX3 dynamic balancer. Dynamic balancing involves using accelerometer sensors to measure the vibration magnitude in inches per second (IPS) the prop/engine is experiencing while in operation.

We chocked the tires and I ran the engine up to 2000 RPM. Without any adjustments, my initial reading showed .23 IPS. After 120 hours TT, I felt my engine/prop were in pretty good harmony and this reading reflected that. Extreme rough is 1.25 IPS and anything less than .10 IPS is ideal.

The DynaVibe unit identifies where the heavy spot is, in my case 210 degrees past straight up. Using an AN3 bolt, washers and nut, Justin added 10.3 grams 30 degrees past straight up on the starter ring gear. (You add the weight 180 degrees from the heavy spot.)

The 2nd runup was a nice improvement and gave us a .10 IPS reading. We took a third swing at it and added another 7.4 grams which brought it down to .02 IPS, darn near perfect.

I will say it does seem a little smoother at cruise but I notice it more at idle.

Once your prop is balanced, you don't need to have it rebalanced, unless of course you damage it or have it repainted.

Get 'em flying. Keep 'em flying.


News from EAA Headquarters



Good News for Experimental Accident Totals

September 30 marked the end of the FAA's fiscal year and with it, the annual conclusion of the annual 12-month tracking of fatal accidents among experimental category aircraft. The preliminary numbers from the agency received late last week appear to present an excellent snapshot of safety over the past year.

While the final totals are still being tabulated, the initial total of 37 accidents is well below the FAA's not-to-exceed figure of 46 for the period. That includes 29 fatal



accidents in homebuilt aircraft. More details will be available in the coming weeks as the FAA's annual total of GA activity is compiled. These figures also mirror what appears to be an improved year for overall general aviation safety, even as total flight hours have increased.

"FAA officials have taken notice of these improved safety figures," said Sean Elliott, EAA's vice president of advocacy and safety. "Agency officials have remarked to us how EAA's programs have helped build the safety culture that leads to these positive numbers."

Among the EAA programs that are focused on aviation safety, especially in amateur-built aircraft, are the longstanding Technical Counselor and Flight Advisor programs, and resources such as the EAA Flight Test Manual that is about to publish its updated second edition. EAA also works with the FAA to establish safety-minded opportunities, such as the second safety pilot allowance for homebuilt flight testing.
